The program focuses on environmental health and safety management with an emphasis on water and wastewater treatment technologies; hazardous waste; hazardous materials; best practices in the environmental health field; emergency response; toxicology; and remediation of pollution of soil, air and water.

The program maintains state-of-the-art technologies to ensure that what students learn is applicable to the jobs they will tackle in the field. The curriculum is guided by an industry advisory committee representing business groups from a broad spectrum of regional industries such as aerospace, construction, and manufacturing. In addition, many small business supervisors take our courses to broaden their understanding of environmental management requirements for their specific industries, and as a result of sharpening their job skills, data shows they experience significant wage increases.
